**ARMED CONFLICTS 2010**

In 2010 there were 30 ongoing armed conflicts. Four of these reached the intensity of 'War'. These were the conflicts in Afghanistan, Iraq, Pakistan, and Somalia.

An 'armed conflict' is defined as "a contested incompatibility that concerns government and/or territory where the use of armed force between two parties, of which at least one is the government of a state, results in at least 25 battle-related deaths in one calendar year". If more than 1,000 battle-related deaths are recorded in one calendar year the conflict has reached the intensity of 'War'.
